Summary of 2019 Legislative Session

fter 140 days of work, Texas legislators concluded the 86th biennial legislative session with a streak of high-profile bipartisan bills sent to Governor Greg Abbott's desk, while avoiding the many pitfalls that threatened to derail their efforts. While not short on controversy, the session was historically productive, addressing issues ranging from school finance reform, to property tax reductions, and disaster preparedness.

BUDGET – The final budget totaled \$250.7 billion in federal, state, and local spending as it was signed by Governor Abbott, saw \$94.5 billion in new school funding, including an overall increase of \$6.5 billion, with an additional \$1.6 billion earmarked for teacher pay raises; and \$5 billion to buy down property tax rates across the state.

Total behavioral health funding is estimated to be \$7.8 billion across 23 state agencies. This supports funding for inpatient client services at state and community hospitals, and the legislature added an additional \$26 million for the purchase of 50 additional inpatient beds. In addition,

the community mental health grant programs were appropriated \$23 million to continue these programs, and \$100 million to support the establishment of the Texas Mental Health Consortium.

The Legislature continued its support for state hospital redesign by funding the next phase of the project at over \$400 million. These dollars will support the construction of additional beds at the Rusk, Austin, and San Antonio hospitals.

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) was appropriated \$157 million for Graduate Medical Education expansion, which includes an increase of \$60 million from the previous biennium. HB 1 also provides additional funding to meet the 1:1 to 1:0 ratio of the first-year residency positions for each medical graduate.

PROPERTY TAX REFORM - In an effort to curb the growth of local property taxes, the legislature approved language effectively capping the rate local governments can increase tax rates without seeking voter approval. With the passage of the bill, cities and counties are limited to increasing their property tax rates by 3.5% annually before triggering a voter referendum on the increase. Similarly, school districts are now capped at annual increases of 2.5% before requiring voter approval.

SCHOOL FINANCE REFORM - The legislature rewrote the school finance process, providing \$6.5 billion to improve public schools and boost teacher salaries, and lowering school district taxes by \$5.1 billion. Additionally, the bill includes full-day pre-K for eligible students, incentives for duallanguage and dyslexia programs, and provisions to develop teacher merit pay systems. SCHOOL SAFETY AND MENTAL

HEALTH – Following the tragic school shooting at Santa Fe High School in 2018, the legislature enacted a sweeping school safety initiative to reduce the risk of future shootings. SB 11 by Sen. Larry Taylor includes provisions requiring specific training for school resource officers, strengthening mental health initiatives in schools, and the creation of teams to identify possibly dangerous students. Additionally, the legislation incorporated language from SB 10 establishing a Texas Mental Health Consortium, which died on the House floor during the last days of session. The goal is to bring psychiatrists together with pediatricians in an effort to expand access to mental health services for children and

adolescents.

HB 1092/SB 268 Authored by Rep. Zedler and Sen. Rodriguez, these bills would allow psychologists to receive training to make them safe prescribers. Trained psychologists will receive training to practice under a physician for 2,000 hours. Neither bill

Why be involved in TSPP?

hope the summer is going well for all of you. I am excited to have the opportunity to share with you who I am, what is important to me as a psychiatrist and why I have chosen to be involved in TSPP.

I am a native Texan, born and raised in Dallas. My parents immigrated to the US from Peru. I was the first in my family to graduate from college followed by graduation from UT Southwestern Medical School. I completed a psychiatry residency and fellowships in child and adolescent psychiatry and forensic psychiatry in Los Angeles. Afterwards, we moved to Portland, Oregon, where I worked for 14 years in outpatient, inpatient and ED settings, evaluating and treating adults and children. In 2009, I accepted a position in charge of Psychiatric Services for the University of Texas at Austin Counseling and Mental Health Center. Shortly after moving to Austin, I joined the Austin Psychiatric Society (APS), and transferred my District Branch membership from Oregon Psychiatric Association to TSPP. APS was a great way to get to meet members and benefit from the CME programming. I

expanded my involvement at APS into leadership roles, which led to involvement in TSPP.

It is important to me as a psychiatric physician to provide high quality psychiatric care to our patients, the children, adolescents and adults who have mental illness. That is one of TSPP's objectives, along with continuing to improve psychiatric knowledge to our members, colleagues and the public and to work in partnership with all colleagues involved in providing care to individual with mental illness. At TSPP meetings, I experienced a camaraderie and support from Texas psychiatrists, including but not limited to Pat Holden from San Antonio, Clay Sawyer from Waco, Debra Atkisson from Ft. Worth, Dan Pearson from Dallas, Esteban Gonzalez from McAllen, Terry McMahon from Lubbock, Lynda Parker from Georgetown and Mark Jacobs from Houston. The TSPP committee under the leadership of Matt Jeffreys has consistently provided outstanding CME programming. TSPP offers ways to get involved. Members can serve on committees. Members can be

involved in advocacy and participate in Capitol Day events, meeting with legislators and talking about issues important to Texas psychiatrists. Our lobbyist, Eric Woomer tracks bills involving mental health issues and keeps TSPP notified. In the event of bills that are potentially harmful to our patients, TSPP can act. A TSPP member can be active in the political process. This past year I testified against a bill and emphasized that the reason for the opposition was patient safety.

I am impressed with the involvement of Resident and Fellows in TSPP. They are our future leaders. We have TSPP Resident-Fellow representatives from programs at Baylor, JPS, Texas A&M Scott & White, Texas Tech-El Paso, Texas Tech-Lubbock, UT Austin Dell Medical School, UT Southwestern, UTHSC Houston, UTHSC San Antonio, and UTMB Galveston. I encourage TSPP members to be involved with and support our residents and fellows. At Capitol Day 2019, I was designated a Team Lead. Residents from UTHSC San Antonio, Sara Noble, Jacob Wardyn and Jennifer Rosenthal, were on my team. They did a great job in

presenting our support and opposition to bills in meetings with legislators' staff. The Resident-Fellow Member Section and Academic Psychiatry committees arranged for a sub-specialty workshop at the TSPP November 2018 meeting. Psychiatrists in different specialties were available to answer questions from residents, and fellows about their subspecialty. emerged from committee.

HB 1792 Authored by Rep. Klick, the bill would authorize APRNS to work independently include ordering, performing and interpreting diagnostic tests, formulating primary and differential medical diagnoses and advanced assessments; and treating actual/potential health problems. The bill died in committee.

SB 1238 This legislation changes the time frame within which a voluntary mental health patient must be examined by a physician from within 72 hours before admission to an inpatient facility to between 72 hours before and 24 hours after the admission. A person admitted to a facility before being examined would have to be discharged immediately if the physician determined that the person did not meet the clinical standards to receive inpatient mental health services, and facilities that discharged those patients could not bill for the temporary admission. The bill was signed by Gov. Abbott and goes into effect Sept. 1, 2019.

HB 10 This bill would have established the Texas Mental and Behavioral Health

Research Institute to create best practices, leadership, and vision for addressing child and adolescent behavioral health needs and to fund research on behavioral health issues. However, the bill failed to pass.

HB 2261 This legislation increases the amount of money a physician can receive under the physician education loan repayment program by \$5,000 each year. This would bring the total amount of assistance available to physicians to \$180,000, and applies to submitted on or after September 1, 2019.

SB 362 This bill modifies procedures and requirements related to court-ordered inpatient and outpatient mental health services, including the standards that would have to be met in order for courts to order such services, the mechanisms for transitioning patients from inpatient to outpatient or continuing care, and the procedures for diverting certain individuals with mental illnesses from the criminal justice system to outpatient services.

HB 1504 This legislation continues the Texas Medical Board (TMB), amend TMB's licensure and enforcement processes, establish a radiologist assistant certificate, and update training for other boards.

HB 2454 The bill requires physicians, APRNs, physician assistants, and dentists to complete a minimum of two hours of continuing medical education (CME) regarding safe and effective pain management for the prescription of opioids and other controlled substances.

HB 2536 This bill requires drug manufacturers, pharmacy benefit managers, and health benefit plan issuers to submit reports on pharmaceutical drug costs. The bill also would require the executive commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) to establish a website to provide drug price information to the general public.

HB 3703 This legislation expands patient eligibility for low-THC cannabis prescriptions and establish a research program.

HB 2050 The bill requires that consent to the prescription of an antipsychotic or neuroleptic medication to a resident of a nursing facility is valid only if it was given in writing on a form prescribed by HHSC by a resident or by a person authorized to consent on behalf of the resident. It included important provisions negotiated by the Federation and TMA.



Professional practice gap: Despite advances in our understanding of depression therapy, many patients with depression remain unresponsive to treatment. As many as 50% of patients who have been treatment with an antidepressant do not respond. In fact, even after 2 antidepressant trials, 30% to 40% of patients do not report significant improvement in their symptoms. The presentation will address the issues in the treatment of the remaining non-responding patients, such as non-adherence, medication substitution, psychopharmacologic augmentation, psychoterhapy, somatic modalities such as ECT, VNS, rTMS, and light therapy.

Professional practice gap: Alcohol consumption is associated with 88,000 US deaths annually. Only 1 in 6 US adults report having been asked by a medical professional about drinking. Alcohol use disorder (AUD) is present in up to 14% of US adults in a 1 year period but less than 10% of these receive treatment. 4 medications are approved by the FDA for AUD but less than 9% of those who may benefit receive a

Alison R. Jones, MD, FAPA Professional practice gap: Rates of smoking are higher in patients with

mental illness compared to the general population resulting in increased morbidity and mortality. Relapse rates are also higher following smoking cessation. Clinicians are often unprepared to work with patients on smoking cessation and may have concerns about potentially negative effects of medications for smoking cessation. Improving rates of smoking cessation in the mentally ill would have a major individual and public health benefit.
