TSPP members have accounted for about 55% of donations since the Foundation began receiving contributions



Foundation Grants



Shame on You

o, not you, if you're a TSPP member. The rest of you: you know who you are. You're Texas psychiatrists, often well-meaning and otherwise nice folks, who reap lots of the professional benefits of TSPP without spending a penny to help cover the substantial costs of maintaining an organization that works tirelessly to:

- Protect your practice and your patients from ill-conceived government intervention, draconian rules, and unqualified clinician-interlopers.
- Keep important treatments available to Texas patients, public and private, and maintain the *clinical flexibility* that psychiatrists need in order to offer and implement them to best effect.
- Protect your patients and others from inadequately trained or experienced nonphysicians who want to prescribe, admit patients, and generally foist likely inadequate care onto the public.

- Protect *your license* and *your ability to practice* from unfair restriction by state agencies.
- Fight for your *fair and prompt compensation* from government, clinical employers, and insurance payors.
- Increase access for your patients (and thousands more you never see) to quality psychiatric care.
- Maintain and effectively use an incredible system of legislative lobbying and other government influence for the good of patients, psychiatrists, and clinical care.
- Speak to government, the news media, and private fora with one voice, the voice of Texas psychiatry, on issues of critical importance to psychiatrists, their patients, and others who desperately need our care.
- Work closely with the rest of the House of Medicine — TMA, APA, AMA, other specialty societies, and their local and regional

- chapters to coordinate our efforts on behalf of physicians and patients, and maximize our (your) strength.
- Offer the only *statewide professional forum* in which individual psychiatrists can actually see the results of their comments, complaints, and criticisms about all of the topics listed here (and more), and participate in specific actions to get things done for patients and clinicians.
- Endorse and practice it's published objectives of promoting the best interests of patients, advancing standards of psychiatric services, fostering cooperation from others in the service of those with mental illness, disseminating psychiatric knowledge, and assisting the American Psychiatric Association in its objectives.
- Endorse and practice its published core values of advocacy, education, service and fellowship.

TSPP is doing all of these as best it can with very limited resources. We can't hope to keep up the current pace without more support from the *over 1000 nonmember Texas psychiatrists* who are getting a free ride (and a few current members who are late in paying their dues). I'm not asking you for your time right now; level of participation is a more personal decision, and we have a great (if small) staff and a core of extraordinary volunteers. I'm asking for your dues, your membership, so that others (and you if you wish) can carry on this vital work from which you and your patients benefit every day.

For the first time in over 50 years, *only* about half of Texas psychiatrists are TSPP members. Texas is known for its independent thinkers, and sometimes it feels good to flex a little maverick muscle, but having only 50% of the psychiatrists in the State shoulder the financial burden for everyone else is a very bad thing. Think about it: you don't like having to pay taxes to support people who should be paying taxes. Then why choose to be one of the "non-taxpayers" who watch other people pay the bills

for the TSPP services you enjoy?

I'm being polite about this. I'm controlling myself, even though I'm not running for anything and I can stand a few disgruntled emails generated by my comments. I'm stopping short of calling anyone a "deadbeat," and I haven't once used the term "parasite." We all know that some nonmembers have acceptable reasons for not joining TSPP, but I just don't buy that argument for most Texas psychiatrists.

Yes, membership in TSPP requires membership in APA. APA does many, many important things for you and your patients, too. It's a bigger organization, representing psychiatrists in all parts of the country, so there are naturally a few things on which you and I and APA disagree. But on balance, we need what APA does, and TSPP is a part of that.

A significant increase in TSPP membership is absolutely necessary to keep us going and to keep us strong. No matter where or how you practice — public, academic, private, military, trainee, earlycareer, mid-career, seasoned citizen, inpatient, outpatient, consultation, general, child, adolescent, geriatric, psychotherapy, psychoanalysis, psychopharmacology, urban, rural — and no matter how you make your living — salary, third party, cash-on-the-barrelhead, or (God bless you) uncompensated volunteer — the last thing you should want is a weak TSPP. Without your membership, we're all in danger. How about a little help?


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TSPP Executive Council Actions...

The TSPP Executive Council met on April 6, 2008 and approved the following action items:

- ★ The Academic Psychiatry Committee recommended that TSPP pilot test a board prep session for residents and recent training program graduates at the November TSPP Annual Convention and Scientific Program. The format of the session will be an overview of the vignette examination, followed by role play activity of 2 vignettes, each followed by a facilitated group discussion.
- ★ The Children and Adolescent Committee recommended that each TSPP Chapter identify one or more psychiatrists to coordinate and develop ideas for community consultation with primary care providers. Names are to be submitted to TSPP and referred to the Children and Adolescents Committee for implementation of the program.
- ★ The Finance Committee recommended that TSPP continue to offer "transition to practice" seminars for residents to be conducted regionally at residency programs and/or during TSPP's Annual Convention and Scientific Program.
- ★ The **Finance Committee** recommended the change in status of a member to Temporary Inactive.
- ★ The **Finance Committee** recommended an operating budget for fiscal year 2008-09.
- ★ The Forensic Psychiatry Committee recommended that TSPP support an Amicus Brief in Maryland Board of Physicians v. Harold I. Eist.
- ★ The Nominating Committee recommended the following members to receive TSPP Awards during TSPP's Annual Convention in San Antonio in November: Distinguished Service Award - Joseph Black, MD (Vernon) and Gary Etter, MD (Fort Worth); Psychiatric Excellence Award - Glen Gabbard, MD (Houston) and George Santos, MD (Houston).
- ★ The Public Mental Health Services Committee recommended supporting two Resolutions to be submitted to the Texas Medical Association by the Dallas County Medical Society, as follows: Supporting State Funding of Mental Hospital Psychiatry Residency Training and Opposing Transformation of Clinical Practice Guidelines into Mandates.
- ★ The **Strategic Planning Committee** recommended adoption of a revised Strategic Plan, including a Mission Statement, Objectives, Short-term Priorities and Councils organized by the core values of membership: Advocacy, Education, Service, Fellowship and Organization.
- ★ The **Strategic Planning Committee** recommended endorsing a proposed new Mission Statement for the APA: "American Psychiatric Association...Helping Psychiatrists provide the highest quality of care."





From the Federation...

y the time that you read this we will have elected new officers for the Federation for fiscal year 2008-2009. I am happy to announce that the following have agreed to serve for the coming year: Chairman: Lauren Parsons, MD (Texas Academy of Psychiatry); Vice-Chair for Education: Steven Pliszka, MD (Texas Society of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry); Vice-Chair for Public Policy: Les Secrest, MD (Texas Society of Psychiatric Physicians); and Secretary-Treasurer: Richard Noel, MD (Texas Society of Psychiatric Physicians). The Nominating Committee always strives to have all voting member organizations represented in the leadership of the Federation. I believe that the Federation will be in good hands for the next year.

Tort Reform

You just thought that the tort reform issue was resolved. This issue was summarized by Roger Detrich, Director of the Cunningham Group in our Federation Delegate Assembly Meeting, and in Dr. Howard Marcus' luncheon presentation at the TSPP Spring Meeting held April 4-6. Prior to 2003, the year that tort reform was passed, the number of companies issuing policies in Texas had dropped to four. In 2003, the Texas Legislature passed liability reforms including a \$250,000 cap on non-economic damages assessed against physicians in a liability judgment. It is important to emphasize that the cap only applied to non-economic damages, or what is commonly referred to as "pain and suffering" damages. The plaintiff still has the ability to recover economic damages related to medical expenses and lost income. Now we have over twenty companies issuing policies in Texas, and premiums on average have been cut more than 25%.

TMA cites several changes before and after tort reform. After having experienced a net loss of 14 obstetricians from 2001 to 2003, Texas experienced a net gain of 186 obstetricians. Texas experienced a net loss of 9 orthopedic surgeons from 2000 to 2003 Since reform, the state experienced a net

gain of 156 orthopedic surgeons, and a net gain of 26 neurosurgeons including one each in the medically underserved communities of Corpus Christi and Beaumont. TMA also notes that Texas licensed a record 3,324 new doctors in 2007, 808 more than the previous year.

The challenge now is coming by the way of several lawsuits challenging the constitutionality of the cap. The most high-profile case being that of former Dallas Cowboy running back, Ron Springs. All individual members of the Federation's organizations need to contact members of the Texas Legislature, develop relationships with your local legislators, and vote in court elections when judges run for office. TMA also has a presentation on the TMA web site www.texmed.org titled "The Texas Tort Reform Story" which can be downloaded and used by physicians in speaking to physician groups. The message we have to repeat is that all of Texas and Texans have benefitted from tort reform. The savings on liability insurance premiums have allowed for establishment of practices in rural areas, expansion of subspecialty practices, and trauma care to underserved areas. The strength that we have achieved through the reorganization of psychiatry in Texas under the Federation of Texas Psychiatry allows us to effectively defend this challenge to the provision of medical care. But it takes every one of us making the commitment to become involved and to speak up.

Education

I wanted to remind all of our members of the upcoming educational conferences of the various organizations of the Federation.

The Texas Medical Association Annual Meeting, TexMed 2008, will be held May 2-3 at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in San Antonio. Dr. Martha Leatherman, current TSPP President, has organized a very interesting and informative Section on Psychiatry program related to issues of capacity and undue influence with respect to geriatric patients. This should be of interest not only

to psychiatrists, but other specialists as well, particularly primary care physicians. I would encourage members to inform their psychiatric as well as non-psychiatric colleagues of this program which will be held on Friday, May 2.

The Texas Osteopathic Medical Association will hold their annual meeting on June 18-22 at the Intercontinental Hotel in Addison, Texas.

The Texas Society of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry will hold their Summer Conference and Scientific Program, "Evaluation and Treatment of Disorders of Early Development" July 18-20 at the Westin La Cantera Resort in San Antonio. Their meetings have been very well attended and have received very positive comments and reviews.

Finally the year will conclude with our TSPP Annual Convention and Scientific Program to be held this year November 21-23 at the Westin La Cantera Resort in San Antonio. The Resort is very family friendly and offers some of the best golf courses around. It certainly is a great location to allow our members to experience the core value of "fellowship" in TSPP.

The TSPP Annual Meeting, the TSCAP Summer Conference, and to some degree, the TMA Section on Psychiatry, would not

be possible without the help of John Bush and Debbie Sundberg as well as members who have given their time to either serve on the CME Committee or to serve as program chairs. The reorganization under the Federation has allowed the Executive Staff to more efficiently and effectively plan and implement these meetings resulting in excellent CME programs.

TARGET AUDIENCE / PROGRAM GOALS & OBJECTIVES

The primary target audience of the program consists of Child and Adolescent Psychiatrists, General Psychiatrists and other specialties of medicine with the objective of addressing quality improvement in clinical outcomes for patients served by the physicians in the State of Texas. This continuing medical education activity will be presented in a classroom style format, with didactic lectures supplemented with audiovisual presentations, case presentations and question and answer discussions.

At the conclusion of the program attendees will be able to:

- Understand issues related to family studies of autism and utilize available tools for the diagnosis of autism.
- Identify psychopharmacological options for the treatment of ADHD in special child and adolescent populations.
- Evaluate ethical considerations in the psychopharmacological treatment of young children.
- Understand the developmental and ethical considerations related to preschool psychopharmacological treatment
- Recognize that current empirical data on psychopharmacological treatments are limited in the preschool age group.

- Understand the risk-benefit ratio of treating preschoolers with psychiatric disorders.
- Discuss biopsychosocial decisions when assessing and treating young children.



"Is That All There Is...?"

o doubt at one time or another in our career as a psychiatrist, we either have been or will be confronted by someone who does not know the difference between a psychologist and a psychiatrist. With so much in common, the two professions are still separated by our four years

of medical school with a subsequent residency.

The corollary to the individual above is the one who thinks all psychiatrists do is "push pills." Unfortunately in many cases, we have done nothing to disavow people of this misconception.

As I write this, I do not intend to debate the obvious question. Rather, I propose to focus on what I consider to be the responsibility we assume when we choose the path of Psychiatry.

I submit it is our duty to not only educate the public about our training and our scope of practice but it is also imperative that we ourselves do not forget that we are physicians first. There is more to being a physician than prescribing pills, or at least I think there should be. Part of being a good physician is being a good listener but it is also being a good detective.

Collecting pieces of a puzzle, creating a picture with those pieces, and correcting

problems that prevent that picture from coming clear are all parts of being a good physician.

A seeming trend is for physicians in general to spend less time listening; less time thinking, and the small amount of time they do take with their patients is spent writing prescriptions for an endless stream of individual complaints never synthesizing a single hypothesis. The pressure to see more and more patients in order to cover overhead and make a living is slowly squeezing the lifeblood from the traditional doctor – patient relationship.

We all learned the saying, "When you hear hoof beats think horses, not zebras," during the course of our education. What we seem to have forgotten is that there are Arabians, quarter horses, pintos and mustangs. All have four hooves, a mane, and a tail, but each has unique characteristics by which they can be identified and distinguished, one from the other. The ability to collect a history, perform a physical examination and create a diagnostic impression which accounts for the symptoms at hand thereby providing the foundation for a plan of care are skills we acquire as we progress through our training.

Once we forget that foundation and rel-

egate ourselves to throwing pills at individual symptoms, we narrow our base to the point we are balancing on the razor's edge.

If you complain of the same pain to three different specialists, they will potentially come up with three different diagnoses for your mid-epigastric discomfort; the cardiologist calls it angina, the gastroenterologist says its an ulcer, while the orthopedist believes it is musculoskeletal. The one thing they do have in common is that they are quick to make a diagnosis based on that single symptom and they want to give you a prescription for it.

The prescription has become a transitional object in modern medicine, replacing the therapeutic relationship, the Marcus Welby bedside manner if you will, with something more tangible, but not necessarily more precious.

While pharmaceutical intervention can be an invaluable tool in the practice of medicine, shotgun prescribing can present its own myriad of problems including additive side effects as well as other untoward drug-drug interactions.

As I get older, I find myself more concerned with the standard approach to medicine that is being taken by other members of the profession. I do not want

to wake up some day in the future to a medicine cabinet that has a pill for every symptom but the cure is worse than the disease; no one really knowing what that disease is because history taking and physical exam skills are a dying art and no one possesses the skill set or the time to put the pieces together to complete the picture.

We owe it to our patients to be curious, to ask the difficult questions, to pay attention to the details and get it right. I'm not just talking about the outcomes we strive to achieve, I am focusing on the effort we put into doing the job we chose for ourselves, the part of the occupation which distinguishes us from other mental health professionals, the medical aspects of diagnosis and treatment.
