Caring for Patients in a Time of Change

The health system reform bill is now law. While the legal and political wrangling will go on for years, the physicians of Texas remain committed to our patients. We want to keep what's good and fix what's broken in our health care system.

Frankly, we cannot allow our political views or the new law to get in the way of what medical care is all about: physicians caring for our patients. Patients and their doctors must work together to take advantage of this change. We cannot waste this opportunity to improve the access and care we provide to our patients. We also must keep a constant eye out for opportunities to improve the new law.

We have begun a massive new education campaign to help Texas physicians and their practices survive and thrive in this new environment. Our patients depend on that. And lucky for them, no organization is better prepared to help doctors in the posthealth-reform jungle than the Texas Medical Association (TMA).

Because of its immense size and scope, the new law contains many provisions that neither we nor our patients fully understand yet. We've asked some of the best health care minds in the state to give us a complete analysis. Right now, here are three good things about the new law soon to happen — and three things the physicians of TMA already know must change.

Three Good Things

- 1. Prevention is covered. Health plans must cover services like vaccinations and screening tests without charging a copay or deductible. Flu shots, childhood immunizations, and cancer screenings will keep us all in better health. And, in the end, they keep down the cost of medical care.
- 2. Uninsured Texans with current illnesses are covered. A new insurance pool will allow the uninsured to buy coverage if they have a preexisting condition. It will allow uninsured Texans— even cancer survivors or those with chronic illnesses like diabetes or high blood pressure to get the coverage they need. They will be able to receive care and ensure their health doesn't get even worse.
- Coverage should be easier to understand. Volumes of legal jargon from the health plans are replaced with summaries and

simple labels. No more wondering if certain services or treatments are covered or if you can afford the copay or deductible.

Three Things That Must Change

- 1. We remain terribly concerned about the Medicare system. Medicare is the largest government health plan we have right now. It is the foundation for many of the changes the new law will bring. The current system is forcing some doctors to make a horrible choice to stop seeing Medicare patients if they want to keep their practices open in order to see any patients at all. We must work together to stop the Medicare meltdown.
- 2. We need to protect the patient-doctor relationship from outside interference. No government agency and no insurance company should come between patients and their doctors. As the bureaucrats work to implement this new law, we promise to fight to ensure doctors and patients can make health care decisions that are best for our patients.
- 3. We need to protect Texas' health care liability reforms. In 2003, Texas voters adopted important medical liability reforms for our state. These changes have made it easier for sick and injured Texans to get the care they need. Dozens of rural

and medically underserved parts of the state now enjoy the services of high-risk specialists, such as emergency physicians and obstetricians. Physicians who once turned away high-risk patients for fear of a lawsuit are now expanding their practices and offering new, life-saving treatments. We need to make sure nothing in the new law takes away the tremendous progress we've made in Texas.

Since 1853, the physicians of TMA have worked to improve the health of all Texans. Medicine has changed tremendously over those 157 years. The health reform law is just the most recent change, and we now must move forward to ensure that it benefits our patients.

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A Great Year... A Bright Future

v term as TSPP President is coming to an end this month and it has been an honor to serve. I have had the opportunity to have a sneak peak at the data to be presented at our Spring meeting. Let me tell you it is good news. We will finish the year with a financial surplus for the fiscal year and growth in our membership numbers. This is a testament to the management of John Bush and Debbie Sundberg and the continued support from the membership. When we asked for financial support from the members, you all answered with contributions to keep our organization strong. Almost 60% of our members have already made a voluntary contribution to support TSPP's advocacy work. The annual meeting last year was a huge success. It was the best attended scientific meeting since 1990 giving an additional needed financial boost. These efforts and the quality of our programs and advocacy work are the reasons more have joined TSPP and why we remain a strong relevant organization.

Throughout the last several months, we have worked diligently to monitor and work with the Texas Medical Board in its efforts to revise the rules governing telemedicine. To be sure, technology has advanced and new

issues have arisen in the arena of medicine and advanced technologic communication. We reviewed some of the new rules as they apply to the practice of "telepsychiatry" at the Spring meeting. We would have been in a much more difficult position if it were not for the tireless work from our lobbyist Steve Bresnen and his coordination with John Bush and our members. There have been several members directly involved in meeting with the Texas Medical Board to advise on the revision and refinement of the new rules. We have been very successful in informing them of the special needs and circumstances of psychiatric assessment and treatment via technology. I think the final outcome is positive and reasonable as a product of collaboration between the Medical Board and medical and consumer stakeholders around the state.

Of course, there is a great deal of work to come in participating in the implementation of healthcare reform as it takes shape in Texas. We will be at the table and take an active role. That is what TSPP does best. There are also growing challenges within Medicaid and Medicare that may affect us all. The Medicare Recovery Audit Contractor program, or RAC audits, are underway and

coming to a community near you. The Tax Relief and Health Care Act of 2006 made the Medicare RAC audit program permanent and expanded it to cover all states. RACs are supposed to identify "improper" payments, both overpayments and underpayments. Of course, in the three-year demonstration period, only 4% of the identified payment problems were underpayments leading to additional funds to the provider. The rest led to providers and facilities having to return funds to Medicare. The RACs, i.e. the auditors, are paid on a contingency fee basis. They receive a percentage of the "improper" overpayment collected from providers. The RACs may review the last three years of a provider/facilities claims and medical records. I think we all agree there is a need for appropriate oversight, but we have to monitor the potential conflict of interest inherent in the contingent fee nature of such an audit program. I am sure there will be future advocacy work in this arena from a variety of organized medicine and healthcare facility organizations. Stay tuned.

As I reflect over the year, it has been very encouraging meeting members and young physicians around the state. I see a growing

enthusiasm and willingness to engage in advocating for our profession and our patients. Growth in our membership could not come at a better or more exciting time. Regardless of where one stands politically on healthcare reform, it is an exciting and historic period. This is the time to get involved and add your voice to inform and shape the process.

I want to thank everyone for the opportunity to spend a year as President of TSPP. I look forward to working with Dr. Richard Noel as he takes over this leadership role. It all works only because of the dedication of John Bush, Debbie Sundberg, Steve Bresnen, and of all of the members. Please stay involved and keep up the support.

TSPP Advocacy Fund Receives Broad Support

n January 1, 2010, TSPP launched an appeal for members to contribute \$100 each to the TSPP Advocacy Fund. As of April 21, 2010, almost 60% of members have already responded with their payment of \$100. TSPP's goal is to reach 100% participation by year-end.

TSPP's Executive Council approved a onetime \$100 assessment in November to be applied to all members except for residents in 2010. The assessment even applies to inactive members and life status members who have earned the privilege of being "dues exempt." A similar action was taken by TSPP in the mid-1980's, which contributed significantly to the establishment of TSPP's Advocacy Fund, a fund not included in TSPP's usual annual operating expenses. As

provided for in TSPP's Bylaws, the Executive Council has the duty and responsibility of levying such dues and assessments. The governing body would not have made this second request for an assessment in over twenty years if it were not because of serious financial issues. The measure was also taken in lieu of a dues increase, which would be permanent and would be a requirement to maintain membership in TSPP, as well as the APA and Chapters because of joint membership requirements. While the Executive Council could have chosen to require payment of the \$100 assessment to maintain membership, the Executive Council chose instead that payment of the assessment be voluntary and not be mandatory. However, there is an expectation that members will

voluntarily be supportive of their professional association, even during difficult financial times for all.

TSPP's annual dues of \$395 for most members do not cover all that TSPP does. For example, over the past 5 years, dues income was only 71% of TSPP's operating budget. This means that if dues were to cover all that TSPP does, dues would need to be about \$535 instead of \$395. The Advocacy Fund and nondues revenue generated by TSPP have allowed TSPP to maintain its dues structure constant for many years, avoiding dues increases for members to cover any operating deficits. As a result, TSPP's dues are substantially less than other comparably-sized District Branches of the APA (ie Florida =\$510; Pennsylvania = 420; and Washington DC = 500).

Polypharmacy and Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Patients

ollowing up on Paul Croarkin, DO's, excellent article, "Antipsychotics and Young Children" in the February/March, 2010, Texas Psychiatrist, Dr. Croarkin has heightened our awareness of House Bill 2163 (81st Legislature, Regular Session, 2009) which mandated that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) shall perform a study and submit a report in 2010 regarding the "appropriateness and safety of providing antipsychotic medications through the Medicaid vendor drug program to children younger than 16 years of age." The review is to consider the various factors relevant to that issue.

The involvement of government bodies in the psychiatric care of patients is not new to Texas psychiatry. The *RAJ vs. the Commissioner of Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation (TxMHMR)* was my own introduction to this phenomena. This case was under the auspices of Federal District Judge Barefoot Sanders. The court ruled in favor of RAJ, the initials of a State Hospital patient. There were many factors

in question regarding patient care emerging from the lack of individualized treatment plans for patients to the practice of polypharmacy in TxMHMR State facilities treating adult inpatients. Various efforts went into the attempt of TxMHMR to ameliorate the problems facing patients. Finally, Judge Sanders directed David Pharis, MSW., to implement a sophisticated plan designed to improve the entire system. I participated with a team of professionals including psychologists, social workers, nurses, specialists in Internal Medicine and psychiatrists. The "Judge's Team" interfaced with the TxMHMR team and teams from the Texas State Hospitals. Each team also had a Consumer Advocate on board representing patients and their interests. Compliance with goals stipulated by Federal District Judge Barefoot Sanders was the goal.

Over time, the teams worked together identifying areas in each State Hospital where there was "room for improvement" in patient care. My own team's experience was shared by others and the gradual move

toward "improved care" for indigent mentally ill in Texas was accomplished. The reduction of the use of polypharmacy was one of the major improvements. The lay people on our team characterized this as "the removal of chemical straight jackets." Of course, our teams were also looking at over use and/or abuse of "seclusion and restraints" which was another of the multiple issues Judge Sanders ordered us to examine and to improve as the need arose.

Just like my colleague Dr. Croarkin, I often wondered why this task came our way. I remember when John Bush contacted me to be on the Judge's Team because a Federal court had found patient care in our State Hospitals lacking. Now pediatricians and child/adolescent psychiatrists face a wake-up call from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. It is painful to have a Commission looking over our shoulder or, worse, telling us what to do. But there is something amiss. As Clinical Director of a therapeutic school for children ages 5-15, I discover that 90% of

the children come to us on psychotropic medications. The number of different psychotrophic medications taken by children as young as five ranges from a minimum of two to a maximum of eight. Often, these medications include more than one modern antipsychotic drug. Parents report they believe the antipsychotic medication "will take the edge off." While it is lamentable to report polypharmacy among children who, with appropriate care, have been able to reduce or eliminate the use of antipsychotic drugs, our experience underlines the need for vigilance in providing state of the art care for all children, including those the HHSC study is intended to protect.

ubstance use disorders are a pernicious problem for many of the patients we treat. Relevant, research has advanced our knowledge regarding the epidemiology, differential diagnosis, comorbidity, pathophysiology, and treatment approach for these disorders.
