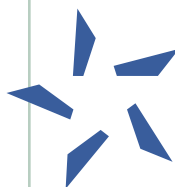

In 1987 I started on a journey with my son and at the time had no idea what the importance or duration of this journey might be. In fact, I am sure I assumed that this was a three-year obligation to participate in the local YMCA Indian Guides/Indian Princes Program that would pass very quickly. The initial meeting brought together a diverse group of fathers and sons with no one clearly being in charge. Our kids had no difficulty in defining their mission and were quickly racing around the yard and 2 future guides finding their way to the roof of the house. The owner of the house was somewhat dismayed and quickly asked the question, "is this what this program is going to be all about?" There was a pause then a majority response of "yes we think so" quickly terminating any opportunity for thoughtful discussion. Although haphazard, we all took the first step.

This is just one example where the first step in a journey provided no insight as to where the next many steps would lead. The following years happened so quickly I hardly realized that a very important and entertaining journey had begun. Coordinating and corralling 28 guides and fathers with different interests, backgrounds, ideas of parental control and stages of development provided opportunities and challenges for the collective group. Personally, I always had hope for the kids but felt the opportunity for maturing had likely bypassed one of the fathers. At the same time he still contributed in very important ways. Roles and levels of participation evolved over time. There was a chief of our tribe and one of the fathers became chief of the entire Indian Guide nation. There was always fun but equally or more important the opportunity for serious discussions with our children. Interestingly, our children tell us today how important this time was and how important it was to have fathers, not just their own, talk to them in a respectful and serious manner.

Perhaps most telling about this unique group is that we still continue to meet annually over 25 years later. It is amazing what bonding and commitment can lead to if only given the chance. Every year we meet at a

river house just above Gruene, Texas. The level of participation is remarkable, with many young men flying in from New York, Los Angeles or San Francisco not wanting to interrupt what is a wonderful journey. The torch is clearly being passed to the next generation.

So what does this have to do with organized medicine. Although extremely different, I find many commonalities. My first memory is of the Texas Psychiatric Association meeting I attended when I was a third-year resident at the University of Washington hoping to make meaningful contacts in the state of Texas. My goal was to establish a practice somewhere in Texas. What a wonderful experience. That one meeting resulted in the opportunity to visit seven different locations around the state being exposed to many styles and opportunities for setting up my clinical practice. What a gracious and generous group of psychiatrists. Ultimately, I settled in Dallas at Timberlawn Hospital and only later did I appreciate what that first step in organized medicine had led to.

I quickly joined the Texas Psychiatric Association which ultimately became Texas Society of Psychiatric Physicians (TSPP). In those days there was great socialization, comradery, continuing education, but certainly not the level of business structure organization or mission we see today. I will provide one example to help our younger members appreciate the contrast. Today, John Bush provides an extremely detailed financial plan with easily understood cost centers as well as accurate financial projections with outside party verification. It was in my first or second year as a member in the

mid- 1980s that I was belatedly handed a shoebox full of receipts, 15 minutes prior to the annual business meeting. I was asked to review the receipts and verify that everything was in proper financial order. I reluctantly did so being assured that this business model has been used for many, many years. Talk about children on the roof, but it worked at that stage of the organization.

It is easy to see that TSPP has continued to evolve and define itself over the past 25 years. Like raising children, TSPP has faced many developmental challenges in addition to a variety of external challenges. Who can forget the onset of managed care, the private psychiatric hospital crisis of the 1990s, recurring scope of practice issues and external organizations such as the Scientologists challenging our autonomy in the areas of medication management or providing ECT. These challenges go on and on requiring constant vigilance.

Does anyone think we could have survived these challenges alone as individual practitioners? For me, the answer is obvious. **Organized medicine and particularly TSPP has provided and continues to provide the collective voice for our patients as well as for our individual goals and interests.** Every time that TSPP meets there is a gathering of very unique individuals and practitioners coming together for a common goal and good. Very much like the Indian guides where no two parents or children who were just like, it is a common interest that holds us together with no end in sight. The only thing that can stop this journey is ourselves.

Each psychiatrist can choose their own level of involvement. All levels are important.

TSPP strongly supports joint membership of the APA and TSPP. TSPP recognizes however, that this membership classification is not for everyone. Recognizing the importance of participation in organized medicine an alternative membership category is available. The Texas Academy of Psychiatry provides many of the same opportunities of a TSPP membership. An Academy member may attend and participate in TSPP meetings as well as attend CME functions. Although one cannot be a committee chair or a TSPP officer all benefits of organized medicine are available to members of the Texas Academy of Psychiatry, which does not require mandatory joint national membership. Without your membership participation at some level the voice of medicine is not as strong as it could be or needs to be.

Please evaluate where you are in the organized medicine journey. It can and needs to be a long-term commitment in order to best represent our patients and our profession. If you have not started or perhaps have left the journey please reevaluate the importance of your personal participation. Join us in our journey! ■

The State of Texas Never Sleeps...

As usual, there is plenty of activity related to psychiatry occurring at the state level. The Federation is pleased to provide this update of our recent government affairs activities.

The Texas Sunset Commission has begun in earnest its review of the Department of State Health Services (DSHS) and other Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) enterprise agencies. The Sunset commission staff has now released reports evaluating each agency. The staff report on DSHS was particularly caustic. Staff declared that there is an existing crisis in the state mental health system, and that DSHS has struggled to deliver integrated outcome focused community mental health and substance abuse services. The staff recommends fundamental changes to its core services, including discontinuing 19 regulatory programs currently housed at DSHS, and transferring another 12 regulatory programs to the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation. Overall, Sunset staff believes that the current DSHS agency structure is unmanageable, and that the leadership needs to provide greater direction. DSHS will be the subject of discussion by the full Sunset Commission at the end of June.

The Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) did not fare much better. The Sunset commission staff recognized that the agency has been on the defensive and has been in a constant state of putting out fires and responding to crisis, but suggested they have not done enough to address staff turnover, and that the agency continues to struggle to reform the state's foster care system. Both DSHS and DFPS were criticized for a lack of a stakeholder-driven process, a criticism that the Federation has voiced in the past. The Federation is in the process of meeting with Sunset members and their staffs to share our perspective on each agency, and will continue to work through the Sunset process as these agencies are being reviewed.

The Texas Board of Nursing has proposed new rules related to advanced practice registered nurses, or APRNs. Much of the changes deal with the APRNs effort to codify language from their national nursing compact, but some of the provisions relate to nurses operating in mental health practices, as well as nurses operating under a prescriptive authority or agreement or some other delegated medical arrangement. The deadline for public comment on the new rules is June 30, and the Federation is holding meetings with other specialty societies as well as the Texas Medical Association in advance of that deadline. We will be reviewing the proposed rules, and

providing commentary to the Nursing Board.

DSHS continues to make slow, steady progress regarding the restraint and seclusion rulemaking. Two recent drafts have been circulated to the Federation, and we have twice provided written feedback to the agency, as well as participating in staff meetings. Many of our fundamental concerns have been addressed through language tweaks and clarifications, but we will be watching for the new "final" rule to be issued, to ensure that all of our concerns are addressed. The rules are scheduled to be implemented after the first of July of this year.

The Federation, along with TMA and other stakeholders, held a meeting with HHSC staff to express concerns about the Drug Utilization Review Board and its processes. The Board recently made clinical edits to ADHD medication prescribing and proposed new edits for psychotropic medications, both of which were problematic from a physician perspective. As a result of those meetings, HHSC revisited the ADHD clinical edit, and reversed its prior position of using the FDA-approved maximum daily dosage criteria. That edit will instead be replaced with a literature-based maximum dosage (a standard currently used by the DFPS psychotropic medication utilization review parameters, or PMUR, for children in foster care). The antipsychotic clinical edit was shelved for the time being. Both of these changes were big wins for the Federation's efforts to protect physician's prescribing autonomy.

The H.B. 1023 report related to mental health workforce shortages continues to be a topic of much discussion. The Federation has held several meetings with DSHS staff in an effort to address our concerns about the initial draft of the report. Consequently, the report's preliminary recommendation that psychologists be granted prescribing authority was rescinded, and new recommendations are being formulated. The Federation provided a letter jointly signed by TMA and the Texas Pediatric Society to DSHS with many suggested avenues for addressing the Texas mental health workforce. We anticipate a final report being issued in the next several months.

There has been a fair amount of discussion about low Medicaid rates paid to social workers, among other providers. House Human Services Committee Chairman Richard Raymond of Laredo has submitted a request to the Attorney General's office to look at a conflict between a statute enforced by the Texas Department of Insurance and a HHSC rule about licensed social workers and other providers receiving 70% of the Medicaid allowable rate. The position of the Federation has been that Medicaid rates are

too low across the board, and should be increased for all providers, not just for social workers. However, some believe there is an inconsistency about how the current laws are being enforced. The Federation will keep you abreast of these developments.

The Federation continues its efforts to work together with other mental health organizations to speak with one voice on mental health issues where appropriate. We have settled on a name – the Texas Coalition for Healthy Minds – and are working on a website and a logo. Where suitable, the Federation will support other mental

health groups to offer public comments, write letters to policymakers, and prepare public testimony. The Federation will not be asked to take a public position that is contrary to our core principles – the Texas Coalition for Healthy Minds is meant to promote commonality among the various mental health groups, and will shy away from controversial positions, leaving individual organizations to advocate for those policies on their own.

Last session, as a part of adopting the state budget, the Legislature approved Budget Rider 83, which requires DSHS to develop a 10-year plan for the provision of psychiatric inpatient hospitalization within the state psychiatric hospital system. The plan must consider timely access to patient care in the least restrictive setting, access to services close to home, best practices and efficient use of state resources. Presently, DSHS is seeking stakeholder input. The Federation has been asked to participate in stakeholder meetings in Austin during the next several weeks. TMA has also been asked to participate, as has the Texas Hospital Association (THA). We will keep you abreast of these developments.

The Federation, TMA, and THA have continued our recent discussions about how to pursue legislation to allow physicians to issue an emergency hold on a patient for a period of time to make an accurate diagnosis about their mental state. The political climate in Texas is such that a long hold – on order of 48 hours –

as well as liability concerns and the differences between emergency settings in rural and urban areas. Our goal is to have a comprehensive agreement among organized medicine prior to moving ahead with any legislation.

Politically, the primary runoffs came and went in May. Everything you may have heard about the Tea Party's electoral power waning nationally does NOT apply in Texas, where the conservative insurgent group again flexed its muscles in several key races. A longtime U.S. Congressman was sent home to lick his wounds, as was a sitting Lt. Governor, a well-funded Attorney General candidate and a tenured State Senator, while a number of down-ballot races had a distinct taste of Lipton.

There were a fair number of victories by "mainstream" GOP candidates, but in each of those, the winner was trailing after the primary and was able to close the gap when some of the more ignoble histories of their Tea Party opponent came to light during the runoff. The Texas Senate will have a new Lieutenant Governor for the first time in 12 years, as well as seven or eight new Senators. The Texas House of Representatives will have many new members as well, but Speaker Joe Straus will continue to wield the gavel.

The Ryan Haight Act and the Changing Face of Telemedicine

The advent of telemedicine has made it possible to provide high quality medical care for underserved areas of Texas. Patients in rural areas now have the opportunity to receive care from the state's best physicians when before travel costs would have made it impossible. Because of the new nature of telemedicine, state and federal laws and regulations have remained in flux. It is important for any telemedicine provider to be aware of these changes to ensure they remain compliant.

One of the most significant changes to telemedicine was the passage of the Ryan Haight Act in 2008. The Act places a number of restrictions on the practice of online pharmacies and the ability of practitioner's to prescribe medications through the internet. It was named after Ryan Haight, a teenager who died of a drug overdose in 2001 from controlled substances he bought from an online pharmacy. Mr. Haight was able to procure a prescription for Vicodin online without ever meeting a doctor.

The Act regulates anyone who delivers, distributes, or dispenses medication by means of the internet. The Drug Enforcement Agency treats a practitioner who prescribes medication following a telemedicine evaluation as covered under the Act. Generally a practitioner is in violation of the act if he or she does not perform at least one in-person assessment of the

patient before prescribing medication.

The Act does exempt practitioners from this requirement as long as a practitioner meets the federal definition of practicing telemedicine. A physician practicing telemedicine may prescribe controlled substances without an in-person evaluation if: (1) The patient is treated by, and physically located in a hospital or clinic which has a valid DEA registration; and (2) the telemedicine practitioner is treating the patient in the usual course of professional practice, in accordance with state law, and with a valid DEA registration. 21 USC 802(54)(A). The most important thing to note for a practitioner is that the location where the patient is being treated must be a hospital or clinic that is itself registered with the DEA.

The requirement that the patient be in a hospital or clinic with a DEA registration is more stringent than Texas Medical Board requirements. Under Board rules, a physical, in-person evaluation is not necessarily required to prescribe medication and there is no requirement that the hospital or clinic have a DEA registration. A physician may treat a patient solely through telemedicine as long as the physician creates a physician-patient relationship, the patient is being treated at an "established medical" site, e.g., a clinic or hospital, and all additional requirements are met, including the use of a qualified presenter to examine the

patient. Texas law also mandates that a telemedicine provider create and maintain detailed written protocols aimed at preventing fraud and abuse as well as separate policies covering the protection of patient privacy.

There are a number of other special types of telemedicine that under federal law allow a practitioner to prescribe medication without an in person visit, such as practicing telemedicine while working for the Veterans Administration, or receiving a special exemption from the Attorney General. The interaction between federal law and state law in this field is complicated and changing, and

piecemeal construction of the Controlled Substances Act.

If you are a physician who is thinking of beginning a telemedicine practice, it is important to seek the advice of experienced counsel to ensure your practice meets all federal and state law requirements. The applicable law can be complex and involve overlapping mandates on both the state and federal level. In Texas the rules regarding telemedicine continue to evolve as the Texas Medical Board frequently revisits this issue, often with an eye towards making more stringent regulation.

An Important Alert from PRMS Regarding Windows XP Users

Please be advised that Microsoft will no longer maintain Windows XP as of April 8, 2014.* Microsoft will no longer provide security updates, fix bugs, or offer call center support for Windows XP users. What does this mean for you? If you are still using Windows XP in your practice – 28% of all computer users continue to do so – the security of your Protected Health Information (PHI) may be in danger, potentially resulting in liability. In order to secure your PHI, minimize your risk, remain HIPAA-compliant, and meet your professional obligation to keep patient information secure, we suggest you to do the following:

1. Review HIPAA! It is important to understand what capabilities are required of your operating system by law. For more information on HIPAA's requirements, contact your risk managers.
2. Do the research. Before utilizing any new program that will manage PHI, assess its strengths, weaknesses, and whether it will be the right fit for your practice.
3. Upgrade your operating systems to ensure that they are up to date and compliant with HIPAA. Windows XP is now being phased out. If you continue to use this operating system, you will open yourself up to elevated risk and exposure over the coming months.
4. For those devices that have yet to be updated, create an implementation

schedule and stick to it! *It has been reported that Microsoft will continue to maintain the XP malware engine for another year until July 14, 2015. However, they have already had their final public release of security patches.
