Dr. Maria Lopez-Rosario, MD, Psychiatry Fellow and Meredith Chapman, MD, faculty

discussant, both from UT Southwestern will present the Resident Case Presentation: Doing More with Less in the Consult Setting. For psychiatrists who are already collaborating with physician extenders, or who are considering developing that as part of their practice, Moira Wertheimer, RN, JD, CPHRM will discuss the ethics of "Supervisory, Consultative and Collaborative Relationships: Liability Concerns with Split Treatment." Legislative Update

The 84th Texas Legislature has now adjourned Sine Die, and it was a remarkably successful session for mental health in many respects. There were tremendous gains from a policy standpoint as well as from a budgetary perspective. There were a couple of notable setbacks, but on balance the session was very good to the practice of psychiatry.

First, with respect to the budget, Texas lawmakers in both chambers overwhelmingly approved a \$209.4 billion two-year budget, a 3.6 percent increase over the current one. The budget leaves \$6.4 billion unspent, including \$2.9 billion under the state's constitutional spending cap, which limits the growth of some state funds.

Lawmakers also left untouched another \$11 billion in the state's Rainy Day Fund, which

is fed by oil and gas production taxes. The budget also includes funding to cover \$3.8 billion in property tax relief and franchise tax cuts for Texas businesses. Another \$800 million going to border security funding, and lawmakers provided a occupations tax cut to physicians and other professionals.

Critics believe the \$61.2 billion legislators budgeted for the next two years of Medicaid almost certainly won't be enough, and the state will probably have to pump in more money before the biennial budget cycle is through.

Graduate medical education and physician specific programs fared well. The budget reflects approval of \$57 million in new GME funding, which includes \$53 million for GME expansion grants over the biennium, compared with current \$14.3 million.

One of the key GME bills was Senate Bill 18 by Sen. Jane Nelson, which expands and funds several key GME programs, including \$3.5 million for GME planning and partnership grants; \$32.55 million for creation of new first-year GME positions at \$75,000 per resident/per year; \$12m of this is specifically for new GME positions that prepare physicians for entry into primary care; \$9.75m for unfilled first-year GME positions; and \$7.2M for continued grant support to residency positions that were

created with state grants this biennium.

Additionally, S.B. 239 by Sen. Charles Schwertner, to expand the mental health workforce by creating a loan repayment program to benefit psychiatrists, psychologists and other mental health professionals. The legislation creates a \$5 million dollar loan repayment program for the next 5 years.

The budget also increases medical school funding by 3% or \$1,321 in annual per student formula funding, a net increase of \$48 million for a state total of \$601 million. Joint Admission Medical Program (JAMP) remained constant at \$10.21 million for the biennium, and the State Physician Education Loan Repayment Program also remained level at \$33.8 million.

This year, the Sunset Review process looked specifically at the healthcare enterprise agencies under the Health and Human Services Commission umbrella. Notably, legislators passed an HHSC reform bill, but did not consolidate all health agencies into the Commission, as was originally envisioned. The Department of State Health Services remains an independent entity with an independent commissioner. Remarkably, all the sunset bills related to HHSC agencies passed the Legislature – in recent years, large agencies typically

undergo sunset review at least twice before the Legislature finally enacts reforms.

Lawmakers enacted HB 2216 by Rep. Garnet Coleman and HB 2708, also by Coleman, both of which address the stigma associated with mental illness when Texans pursue their driver's license. These bills strikes the question on the driver's license application regarding mental illness status and permit Texans who may have a history of mental illness to teach driver education programs to their family members.

SB 674 by Sen. Donna Campbell deals with suicide prevention. The bill replaces instruction in detection of students with mental or emotional disorders with instruction regarding mental health, substance abuse, and youth suicide as instruction a person must receive as part of the training required to obtain certain educator certification. Also, Rep. Senfronia Thompson

past HB 3404, which creates a study at the department of State Health Services to look at increasing private insurance coverage of post traumatic stress disorder.

And in another victory, despite an effort by the psychologist's association to enact prescribing legislation, they were unsuccessful in finding an author to offer the bills. Our message that prescribing should be reserved for physicians was well-received by the legislature. Clearly, our education efforts in this respect pay dividends.

Unfortunately, two of the Federation's priority bills did not survive. Legislators overwhelmingly passed SB 359 by Sen. Royce West, commonly referred to as the "emergency holds" bill, that allowed physicians to initiate a four-hour hold for patients they believed to be mentally ill that are a danger to themselves or others. Also passing both chambers overwhelmingly was HB 225 by Rep. Ryan Guillen, which created greater access to the opioid antagonist Naloxone for the prevention of overdoses. It also provided a "good Samaritan" exemption from prosecution for drug offenders to encourage calling emergency personnel when an overdoes takes place.

Unfortunately, both of these bills were vetoed by Gov. Greg Abbott, despite the strong support from the Federation, the Texas Medical Association, the Texas Hospital Association, the sheriff's association, and mental health organizations like NAMI-Texas

and MHAT-Texas. The veto was a disturbing and sad turn of events, and occurred despite intense lobbying of the governor's office in support of the bills. Ultimately, an ad hoc coalition of "liberty"-minded activists characterized the bill as violation of Texan's civil liberties – a preposterous charge unsupported by the facts. Clearly, a profound education effort with respect to the governor's office is necessary during the interim.

More generically, the Legislature enacted SB 751, allowing for biological substitutions of certain medications while preserving a physician's prerogative to indicate "dispense as written" on the prescription.

Lawmakers also passed House bill 839, which retains a juvenile offender's eligibility for Medicaid when they emerge from detention facilities. Without this change, mental health services can be interrupted,

and continuity of care for youthful offenders with mental illness problems is compromised.

The Federation worked extremely diligently to protect the interests of psychiatric physicians. We appreciate the willingness of the membership to provide expert testimony and reach out to legislators to endorse particular bills. Please let us know if you have any questions.




