Legislative Overview

here is a tremendous volume of issues ongoing at the Texas capitol. I am pleased to share with you the activities that the Federation of Texas Psychiatry is undertaking for the benefit of the practice of psychiatry and your patients.

ISSUES FACING PSYCHIATRY

I am currently tracking nearly 600 bills that affect psychiatry and the practice of medicine. Among the most critical:

Psychological Prescribing: Rep. Bill Zedler filed H.B. 1092, which has been referred to the House Public Health Subcommittee on Health Professions. The bill authorizes independent prescribing by psychologists, and at the upcoming hearing, subcommittee members will hear from psychiatrists about the danger that undertrained prescribers pose to patients with mental health issues. Currently, five states (Idaho, Iowa, New Mexico, Illinois, Louisiana) have psychological prescribing. Sen. Jose Rodriguez has filed S.B. 268, which has been referred to the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services, but has not yet been scheduled for a hearing. Defeating this legislation will be a top priority for the Federation, and we will be joining with organized medicine in that effort.

Child & Adolescent Psychiatry Project: Sen. Jane Nelson has filed S.B. 10, creating the Texas Mental Health Care Consortium. The legislation has passed out of the Senate and is in committee in the House. SB 10 creates a consortium of state medical schools to leverage their health and mental health expertise to consult with pediatricians and primary care providers to help them provide better care of Texas children with mental health needs, 75% of whom currently receive care in these settings. Inadequately treated mental health and substance abuse costs Texas local governments over \$2 billion a year in emergency room and justice system costs. The Federation has been a vocal supporter of this important legislation.

Grants and Programs for Research in Psychiatry: Rep. Senfronia Thompson has filed H.B. 10, which will establish the Child

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CAPITOL DAY

The Federation had a terrific turnout at our Capitol Day on March 5th, 2019. Psychiatric physicians and psychiatric residents descended on the capitol, carrying our primary message of patient safety, graduate medical education, and collaborative care. and Adolescent Psychiatric Nursing
Grant Program at the Higher Education
Coordinating Board. The program will
award grants to APRN programs at Texas
universities to increase the number of
enrollments and graduations of students
who seek to become APRNs specializing
in child and adolescent psychiatric
nursing. The bill will also establish the
Texas Behavioral Health Research
Institute to provide funding to provide
direct mental health care and treatment.
The bill has already passed out of the
House committee.

Independent Practice for APRNS: Rep. Stephanie Klick has filed H.B. 1792, which authorizes the Texas Nursing Board to authorize the independent practice of an advanced practice registered nurse who has practiced for at least 2,080 hours under the delegation of a physician. The bill expands the authority of nurses to ordering, performing, and interpreting diagnostic tests, formulating primary and differential medical diagnoses and advanced assessments, and prescribing medications. H.B. 1792 has been referred to the House Public Health Subcommittee on Health Professions, where a hearing is expected shortly. The Federation has taken an active role in opposing this legislation.


ER Holds: The Federation continues to work with the emergency room physicians and the Texas Hospital Association to safely secure patients who are determined to be a danger to themselves or others. Legislation on this important issue was vetoed in 2015, but we have identified new approaches

involving technology, additional funding, and an improved understanding of legal parameters between physicians, facilities, law enforcement and the judicial system.

Death Penalty: H.B. 1936 by Rep. Toni Rose amends the Code of Criminal Procedure to prohibit imposition of the death penalty on a defendant who, at the time of the commission of the capital offense, had a severe mental illness. The bill would establish procedures for a pre-trial hearing at which the defendant would have the opportunity to prove that he or she had a severe mental illness at the time of the offense and would allow the prosecution an opportunity to respond.

RECENT ACTIVITY BY THE LEGISLATURE

The final week of March was capped off by the House's unanimous passage of its biennial budget bill. Votes on amendments to H.B. 1 went well into the night, with the final 149-0 vote being cast at 12:30 AM. The passage of the \$251 billion budget marks a major accomplishment for first-term Speaker of the House Dennis Bonnen, who has received praise from both sides of the

aisle for his work on the bill and the civil tone of debate. Highlights of the budget include a \$9 billion increase in state funding for public education, and a \$2 billion withdrawal from the Economic Stabilization (rainy day) Fund. Alongside the budget bill, the House also passed a \$9 billion supplemental budget for the 2018-2019 biennium, which includes funds related to Medicaid spending, Hurricane Harvey recovery, and teacher pensions.

Immediately following the passage of the House budget bill, the House Ways and Means Committee passed H.B. 2, the House version of property tax reform, at 1:00 AM. The legislation, which would require local governments to receive voter approval before increasing property taxes by more than 2.5%, passed by an 8-3 margin, with all Republicans and Democratic Vice Chair Ryan Guillen voting for it. H.B. 2 has had several amendments added, including exemptions for community colleges, emergency service districts, and hospital districts, as well as the option for local governments to 'bank' unused revenue growth for future increases.

Governor Abbott and Speaker Bonnen also have both pushed back on the need for a special session to pass property tax reform, in the wake of Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick's mention of his willingness to participate in 'as many special sessions as it takes' to get the work done. As of now, both Abbott and Bonnen remain committed to completing all legislative business by sine die.

CME PROGRAM GOAL / TARGET AUDIENCE

This live activity has been designed in a lecture format with case examples followed by an interactive audience question and answer period to provide its' primary target audience of Psychiatrists, as well as other specialties of medicine, with the most up-to-date, evidence-based data that can be translated into clinical practice.

The information and data presented will address the professional practice gaps of the learners and advance the physician's competence and improve their knowledge about the complex contributing factors in this patient population and introduce additional resources and new strategies to improve outcomes so that they may develop strategies to apply the knowledge, skills and judgement of the information presented in the educational activity into their practice.

IDENTIFIED PRACTICE GAPS / NEEDS ASSESSMENT:

TSPP identified educational needs and professional practice gaps from members expressed needs and in medical literature and incorporated it into the CME activity to address the relevant educational needs concerning competence that underlie the professional practice gaps of the participants.

The program will explore the systematic evaluation of people with progressive neurocognitive disorders versus mild cognitive impairment in the aging population. Despite more than two decades of advances in diagnostic criteria and technology, symptoms of Alzheimer's disease and Related Dementia too often go unrecognized or are misattributed, causing delays in appropriate diagnoses and care that are both harmful and costly. First Practice Guidelines for Clinical Evaluation of Alzheimer's Disease and Other Dementias for Primary and Specialty Care (Alzheimer's Association International

Conference 2018; Neurology Advisor. July 23, 2018) The presentation will address the systematic guidelines for the evaluation of cognitive behavioral syndromes in the aging population.

Up to 30% of patients with treatment-resistant schizophrenia treated with clozazpine have residual positive symptoms. Psychiatrists are looking for treatment strategies to improve treatment outcome in this chronically mentally ill patient population. The presentation will address how to access medication response in Treatment Resistant Schizophrenia and adjust treatment approach.

Contributing factors influencing relapse in chronic schizophrenia include non-adherence to medication, difficulty identify relapse and missed follow up appointments, among others. The presentation will address these and other common contributing factors to relapse into psychosis and possible strategies to improve outcomes. (The Welcome Basket Revisited: Testing the Feasibility of a Brief Peer Support Intervention to Faclitate Transition from Hospital to Community, Psychiatric Rehabilitation Journal, 2016, Vol. 39, No. 4, 335-342)

Suicide and suicidal behavior are major public health problems. The suicide rate in the US has steadily increased over the past 2 decades. There are few empirically supported brief intervention strategies to address the problem in various clinical settings. Safety planning intervention training for patients with suicidal ideation has been shown to lead to a reduction in suicidal behavior and to increased treatment engagement among suicidal patients. (Comparison of the Safety Planning Intervention With Follow-up vs Usual Care of Suicidal Patients Treated in the Emergency Department. JAMA Psychiatry. 2018;75(9):894-900. doi:10.1001/jamapsychiatry.2018.1776

There is limited research and varying practices for medical decision making by those with developmental disabilities or severe mental illness. The presentation will address ethical issues in the evaluation of capacity to make treatment decisions in patients with severe mental disabilities and ways to involve patients in shared decision making to the fullest extent possible. This topic directly impacts the clinical practices of psychiatrists. The social context in which the evaluation and treatment are being provided will be addressed during the presentation. 

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
