



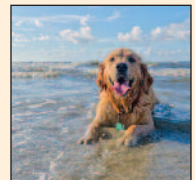

TEXAS ACADEMY OF PSYCHIATRY PROGRAM: "ASSISTED OUTPATIENT TREATMENT (AOT): Another Option for Patient Engagement" Assisted Outpatient Treatment(AOT) has been used successfully across the nation as another option to engage patients with complex mental health needs and poor treatment adherence into ongoing mental health treatment. This presentation will discuss the legal statutes regarding out patient civil commitment in Texas. Panelists from CMHC in Fort Worth , San Antonio and Houston will discuss their experience with this intervention and some of the outcomes achieved.

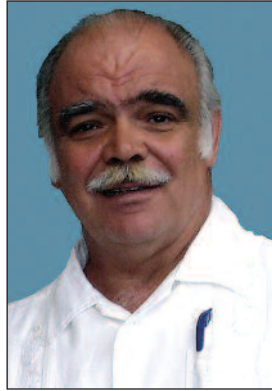

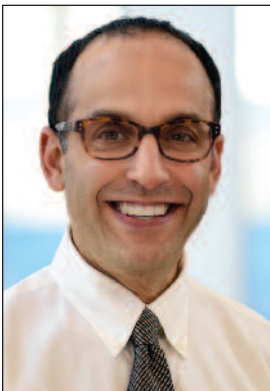

Professional practice gap: Treatment resistant depression is a prevalent problem with a negative societal individual impact. The condition is a leading cause of disability worldwide and results in large economic burdens for society. There are varying definitions of treatment resistant depression with differing guideline recommendations regarding pharmacotherapy and psychotherapy options. The purpose of the program is to inform the practicing clinician about the current scientific research for treatment resistant depression.

Professional practice gap: Only 41% of the 3.1 million adolescents who experienced depression last year received treatment. Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death in adolescents and young adults. College students are increasingly seeking mental health services. There is a need for more psychiatrists with the ability to work effectively with adolescents and young adults.

Objectives: The learning objectives for this activity have been designed to address clinician Competence. Upon conclusion of the activity participants should be able to:

1. Identify barriers to developing a working alliance with adolescent and young adult patients.
2. Competently engage with these patients using brief psychotherapy strategies so that treatment compliance, and therefore treatment outcomes will improve.
3. Competently work with patients to accept and facilitate support from families and other support systems, such as student health centers.

Professional practice gap: Despite advances in our understanding of depression therapy, many patients with depression remain unresponsive to treatment. As many as 50% of patients who have been treated with an antidepressant do not respond. In fact, even after 2 antidepressant trials, 30% to 40% of patients do not report significant improvement in their symptoms. The presentation will address the issues in the treatment of the remaining non-responding patients, such as non-adherence, medication substitution, psychopharmacologic augmentation, psychotherapy, somatic modalities such as ECT, VNS, rTMS, and light therapy.

Objectives: The learning objectives for this activity have been designed to address clinician Competence. Upon completion of this program, participants should be able to:

1. Use a complete diagnostic examination result to guide treatment approaches.
2. Describe various treatment approaches' applications in relevant clinical situations.

Professional practice gap: Alcohol consumption is associated with 88,000 US deaths annually. Only 1 in 6 US adults report having been asked by a medical professional about drinking. Alcohol use disorder (AUD) is present in up to 14% of US adults in a 1 year period but less than 10% of these receive treatment. Four medications are approved by the FDA for AUD but less than 9% of those who may benefit receive a prescription.

Objectives: The learning objectives for this activity have been designed to address clinician Competence. Upon completion of this program, participants should be able to:

1. Screen for and diagnose alcohol use disorders and make appropriate referrals for specialized treatment.
2. Determine which medication for alcohol use disorder is most appropriate for a given patient.

Professional practice gap: Rates of smoking are higher in patients with mental illness compared to the general population resulting in increased morbidity and mortality. Relapse rates are also higher following smoking cessation. Clinicians are often unprepared to work with patients on smoking cessation and may have concerns about potentially negative effects of medications for smoking cessation. Improving rates of smoking cessation in the mentally ill would have a major individual and public health benefit.

Professional practice gap: Suicide rates in the US are increasing, especially in adolescents, young adults and middle aged persons. Suicide is a frequent cause of malpractice claims against psychiatrists but current suicide prediction models have little predictive value. Psychiatrists face ethical dilemmas treating suicidal patients.

Objectives: The learning objectives for this activity have been designed to address clinician Competence. Upon completion of this program, participants should be able to:

1. Identify key ethical questions that arise in working with different patients at risk for suicide.
2. Identify strategies to address these ethical questions in specific patients, with differing illnesses, social supports, etc.
3. Identify and develop professional supports in the event a patient in the psychiatrist's care completes suicide.
