# **TSCAP: Planning for 2023!**

ontinuing Medical Education is vital today. Before the pandemic, we saw the statistics listed below. Since the pandemic, we have seen increases in the need for psychiatric services for our children and adolescents. The Centers for Disease Control in 2018-2019 reported the following statistics for our teenagers:

- 15.1% had a major depressive episode.
- 36.7% had persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness.
- 4.1% had a substance use disorder.
- 1.6% had an alcohol use disorder.
- 3.2% had an illicit drug use disorder.
- 18.8% seriously considered attempting suicide.
- 15.7% made a suicide plan.
- 8.9% attempted suicide.
- 2.5% made a suicide attempt requiring medical treatment.

# **88th Legislative Session Underway**

he 88th legislative session kicked off on January 10th, 2023, and lawmakers are off and running for their biennial 140day sprint!

Prior to the session kicking off, Comptroller Glenn Hegar presented his highly anticipated revenue estimate. Texas has seen an unprecedented economic growth post pandemic, and tax revenue derived from rising inflation on goods and services, higher than average natural gas prices, and an influx on significant federal funds over the course of the current biennium has given the state a budget surplus not seen before. Comptroller Hegar calculated \$188 billion in revenue available for general-purpose spending during the 2024-25 biennium, a 26% increase from the previous biennium. This includes an expected surplus of \$32.7 billion from the previous two-year budget cycle.

In the House, Rep. Dade Phelan, was reelected speaker by a vote of 143-3, and called on lawmakers to work together to pass meaningful legislation for Texans. Governor Greg Abbott and Lt. Governor Dan Patrick were sworn in on the 17th of January 2023 and both outlined their priorities for the upcoming session. Gov. Abbott proposed a comprehensive plan to increase funding for public schools, expand border security, reduce taxes, increase the number of charter schools, expand access to vocational training, provide more resources for students with special needs, reduce the cost of college tuition, invest in safe schools, and fight the fentanyl crisis. Lt. Gov. Patrick also

championed tax relief, including increasing the homestead exemption to \$70,000, as well as expanding parental rights including school choice, increasing rural law enforcement pay, expanding the state's mental healthcare hospital system, and continuing to invest in border security.

On the 23rd of January, Lt. Gov. Patrick announced Senate committee assignments for the 88th Legislature. Many of the fifteen standing committees are set to be led by the same lawmakers as prior years. Texas House committees have yet to be released, but we expect an announcement by Speaker Phelan in early February.

As we head into the meat of the legislative session, there are several mental health related issues we expect to be top priorities for the Federation.

APRN Scope Expansion: The Federation will continue to actively oppose any expansion into independent practice by advanced practice registered nurses (APRNs) and other mid-level providers. However, we do anticipate multiple bills to be filed due to the health care workforce shortages, under the theory that such expansion will ease the shortage.

Psychology prescribing: As anticipated, Rep. Vikki Goodwin refiled a psychology prescribing bill, House Bill 343. We met with Rep. Goodwin earlier this year and shared our reservations about this issue, and we reaffirmed our opposition to the legislation. With Texas' growing mental health need and a shortage of mental health resources, Texas lawmakers should appreciate and understand that removing barriers to psychologists prescribing medication will erode safe mental health care and expose patients to needless risk, without truly saving any money or increasing access to care.

Loan Repayment: Stakeholders, including the Federation, have been working on state efforts to supplement workforce shortages within psychiatry and mental health professions. In the budget initially filed, the Mental Health Loan Repayment Program was increased from \$2 million to \$28 million through Texas Higher Education Coordination Board (THECB).

Forensic Psychiatry: A particular focus for the Federation has been the dearth of forensic psychiatry fellowship programs. Lawmakers have been developing legislation to promote additional psychiatrists and other mental health professionals, and the Federation has been working with stakeholders to develop a mechanism and funding for additional forensic psychiatrists, perhaps through the THECB or through the mental health consortium connected with the schools of psychiatry in Texas.

Emergency Detentions: We are likely to see legislation to address the longstanding problem of emergency detentions orders (EDOs) for patients suffering acute mental health episodes. The bill(s) will authorize and fund the creation of an electronic platform for accelerating mental health emergency detentions applications and add some needed clarity to the law, to ensure

that the EDO process is efficient, transparent, and accountable.

Severe Mental Illness (SMI) Step Therapy: The Federation is leading the effort to curb onerous step therapy or "fail first" treatment requirements for patients with Severe Mental Illness (SMI). Being required to fail on multiple medications can have severe impacts on patients and their mental well-being. Failure to adhere to an appropriate medication management plan can lead to a devastating cycle of mental and physical illnesses and an array of complications that increase healthcare costs and reduce quality of life.

Sen. Jose Menendez (Senate Bill 452) and Rep. Lacey Hull (House Bill 1337) have filed bills will limit "fail first" practices in commercial plans by prohibiting health plans from requiring adult SMI patients to either fail or successfully respond to more than one drug at initial diagnosis, as well as limit medication switching to once annually, and only to identical medications.

# **Capitol Day 2023**

The Federation of Texas Psychiatry welcomed TSPP, TSCAP and TAP members from across the state for Capitol Day 2023. The program began on March 6th with a virtual advocacy training program led by our Public Policy Analyst, Eric Woomer, to review key issues and prepare for legislative meetings. On March 7th, in conjunction with TMA's First Tuesdays, our group of psychiatric physicians descended on the Capitol to speak with the offices of 28 senators and representatives to discuss issues related to scope of practice, emergency detention, workforce, and removing barriers to care.





# Time Marches On


